# **Director's Message**



Dear Friends,

FVPC is very pleased to announce that through a generous donation by Al Cummings and Julia Hall, a new phone system was installed on January 15<sup>th</sup>. We are so thankful for backing of this magnitude. One change that the community at large needs to note is that each staff member has a new extension. When you call into FVPC you will either be greeted by a live staff member or be able to select staff members by name through a staff directory. The staff member's name and extension number will be provided as you access the directory so that you will be able to use the extension in the future and avoid the directory step.



We will use this new phone system as FVPC continues to help all members of a family who are dealing with the effects of domestic violence. Recently, the sister of a domestic violence victim called our 24 hour hotline and shared that her sister made the courageous decision to leave an abusive relationship and asked to stay with her for safety and support. Being anxious and overwhelmed by that task, she called and stated, "I do not know what to do". Our Crisis Intervention Specialist (CIS) assured her she had called the right place and that we are able to support her sister through the stages of healing.



The services that would be of assistance to the victim were reviewed. The CIS described our Healthy Homes education class used to develop empowerment of domestic violence victims and shared that she and sister could attend together. Our hotline worker also suggested community resources that could address new life necessities as well as individual counseling to focus on effects of the abuse trauma. The caller expressed great relief and gratitude for the support she received during the conversation. As the call came to a close, the CIS reminded her that a staff member is available throughout the day and night to answer their phone calls.

This is an example of the advocacy that happens daily. Extended family members often need reinforcement and education about the dynamics of domestic violence and process how to be there for a loved one who seems "stuck" in the abuse. On average a domestic violence victim leaves the home where the abuse is occurring seven times before the final end of the relationship; those seven times span an average of eight years. Over time, battering behavior often drives a wedge between victims and their safe friends and family. We can assist when they need professional guidance and a clear understanding of how to interact with their loved one in a non-judgmental manner. 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# **FVPC** News

**Recap: What We Accomplished In October During National Domestic Violence Awareness Month** FVPC reached over 725 community members including college students, federal employees, air force personnel, advocates and clergy throughout Greene County, promoting awareness of the consequential effects of abuse in our communities along with information about the various supportive services we offer. We participated in events at Wright Patterson Air Force Base, Reynolds and Reynolds, Sinclair Community College, University of Dayton, Central State University and the Combined Federal Campaign Kickoff at the Nutter Center.

We also placed **Purple Ribbons** throughout the county to increase visibility of the common problem of domestic violence and to provide our supportive hotline phone number. Our annual candlelight vigil, **Pause for Peace** occurred on October 6 with increased attendance and messages of hope and support. The group held a moment of silence in memory of the 20 lives that were lost in Ohio due to domestic violence in 2013. We were the headline story on Fox45 that evening.

#### Plan to join us next year for the Candlelight Vigil on the first Monday of October.

**Stand Strong, Be Strong** We were invited to present at this conference held at the Hope Hotel for WPAFB personnel focusing on the resiliency and strength of domes-

tic violence and sexual assault survivors. Debbie Matheson led the group through an interactive activity designed to help people understand the challenges and common experiences of victims trying to leave an abusive relationship. Many people commented that the activity was helpful and thought-provoking. It was a special morning dedicated to honoring the spirit of survivors and strengthening the helpers' responses while providing assistance to those in need throughout the base and the local area.

#### It's Wise to Be Aware

Each month our society seizes an opportunity to raise awareness of special causes. For example, January was National Stalking Awareness Month. Stalking can be a component of domestic violence, often occurring after a survivor leaves an abusive partner. Our definition of domestic violence is a pattern of unhealthy behavior used to impose, gain and maintain power and control over an individual in an intimate relationship. Stalking is a form of control used by someone when the relationship is over, with the intention of intimidating the victim into returning to them. However, anyone can be stalked. You may not even know your stalker, but you may be sure you are being stalked.

Victims of stalking can apply for a stalking protection order through the Domestic Relations Court. Please be aware of other safety steps. Victims should not share their safe locations with anyone outside of their support network. Additional suggestions include: change your normal routines, rent a PO Box, save anything that comes from the stalker, be aware of police stations, let your friends, family, employers know you are being stalked and share any photos you may have. Finally, do not hesitate to call 911 if you feel you are in danger.
