Our Four Focus Areas

Prevention

During the 2016-2017 academic year, the School Dating and Domestic Violence Prevention Education Program reached **3,260 students in 232 classrooms** of 7th through 12th graders. Over **90%** of the students that were reached reported a change in behavior, awareness or other personal impact after the program.

Intervention

The immediate and follow-up support for clients who seek law enforcement after experiencing relationship violence/disputes is critical. Individual and group counseling, case management, education and children's services all help families recover from the trauma caused by relationship violence. In 2017, FVPC's award-winning DIVERT unit responded to **1,476 cases** of domestic violence and disputes, resulting in **2,784 individuals** receiving counseling and support services.

Empowerment



Safe Housing

Immediate safety and support to those fleeing violent situations is accomplished with a 24-hour crisis hotline that provides information and referrals. Last year, FVPC assisted **135 adults and 99 children** by providing **12,453 shelter nights**. Information and referrals were provided to **1,566 callers** through the hotline.

Collaborative Community Programs

Delivered through community events and awareness activities, numerous opportunities were offered to promote healthy relationship education to the public, including; Walk a Mile in Her Shoes, Superhero C.A.P.E. (Child Abuse Prevention and Elimination) 5K Run/Walk, the October Candlelight Vigil, Adopt-A-Family (holiday assistance) and our volunteer program.

There were more than **224 participants** in FVPC awareness activities during 2017; **1,519 individuals** were reached through **24 different presentations** and **85 volunteers gave 4,377 hours of their time** to ensure seamless delivery of FVPC services to our community.
