From the Director

Dear Friends,

FVPC started 2023 off with approval of the robust Strategic Plan generated throughout 2022 with goals and action steps established to propel our domestic and sexual violence prevention and intervention work into the next period of high quality services.

The intersect of domestic and sexual violence victimization became evident early in the domestic violence service development across the United States. In the 1990's, our advocate team evaluated domestic violence victims' aggregated data regarding their lived experience and saw the intersect as well.

We increased our advocate education around interviewing and having conversation about sexual violence within the abusive relationship and from childhood experiences. Survivors shared annually that 40% to 60 % had experienced sexual violence either as adults or as a child. In 2010, FVPC addressed this intersection in the 2011 mission statement alterations and began serving individuals who experienced sexual violence. In 2019, FVPC was established as the certified Rape Crisis Center in Greene County by the Ohio Attorney General's Office. Growth in services requires more service space.

In 2020, we began the process of looking for much needed service expansion space. As many plans progress in business, there is a dynamic nature to a project and a need to be able to pivot when indicated. The first iteration of our plan was to build an Outreach Campus near our existing Campus. We purchased land and were gifted a piece of land adjoining. The Commissioners generously agreed to support the capital needs for the expansion of service space with ARPA funding. The plan to build an Outreach Campus was progressing and shared with our supporters throughout 2021 and in 2022. As building pricing was projected, with two versions of an Outreach Campus, the project quickly became less feasible and not a prudent use of funds.



FVPC's Building Committee began to review the project objectives and steps previously conducted. After determining the capacity of space needed we looked at existing commercial buildings for sale. In review, this is the step we determined we needed to revisit. We began to look for commercial buildings that could meet the needed requirements and would be a prudent and responsible use of funding. Fast forward, with Commissioner's ARPA support County support FVPC was able purchase the building below on Progress Drive and we are in a planning stage of rehabilitation of this property. Stay tuned for future details.

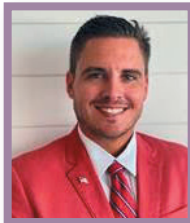

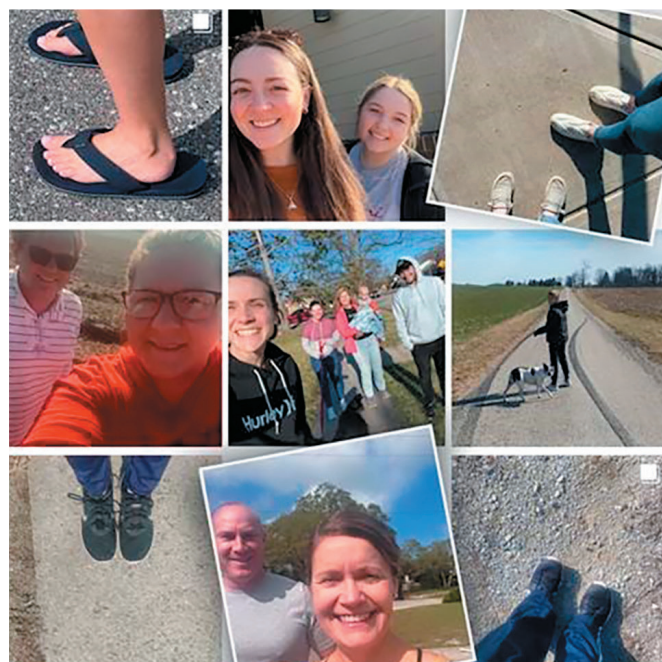

In 2022 we have achieved excellent growth and development across all fronts. In March we received confirmation of earning national accreditation through the Council on Accreditation. Many staff members participated in the essential work required to review standards and generate a large self-study. In a process of rebuilding after covid we were able to bring seven new and energetic board members to the mission work. Salary schedule review was conducted and adjustments made across the organization. FVPC has focused during the great post covid rehire on supporting growth within our existing team and hiring those who are interested and teachable. The Greene County Commissioners supported a much needed service space expansion by selecting FVPC to receive America Rescue Plan Act funding, for which we are so grateful. FVPC has leaned into fundraising and hired a full time Development Coordinator. We were able to conduct in-person "fun"draising in both the spring and fall with very successful events. In December we received grant awards for new sustainable program funding for rapid rehousing of survivors of domestic violence and to engage minority sexual violence survivors. The year held challenges that as a team we worked to turn into opportunities for growth and expansion. A robust strategic plan was developed throughout the year and is setting FVPC up for great success as we move forward in the 44th year of service to Greene County.

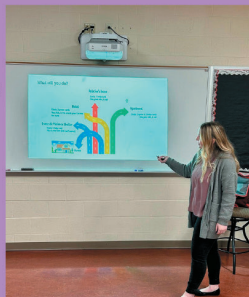

FOUR FOCUS AREAS

Prevention

In 2022, FVPC presented prevention education to about 2500 students in Greene County. This education helps students understand the causes and harmful effects of dating abuse, as well as key ways to prevent dating abuse from happening for themselves and friends. 92% of students surveyed on the impact of the prevention program self-reported specific behavior, awareness, or attitude change as a result of the program.



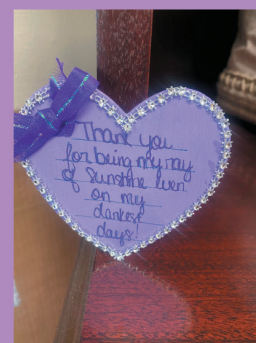

Safe Housing

Immediate safety and support to those fleeing violent situations is accomplished with a 24-hour crisis hotline that provides information and referrals. Last year, FVOC assisted 92 adults and 70 children by providing 9,851 shelter nights. Information and referrals were provided to 427 callers through the hotline.

Intervention

The immediate and follow-up support for clients who see law enforcement after experiencing relationship violence/disputes is critical. Individual and group counseling, case management, education and children's services all help families recover from the trauma caused by relationship violence. In 2022, FVPC's award-winning DIVERT unit responded to 1,232 cases of domestic violence disputes, resulting in 2,967 individuals receiving counseling and support services.

Collaborative Community Programs

Delivered through community events and awareness activities, numerous opportunities were offered to promote healthy relationship education to the public, including Superhero 5K, the October Candlelight Vigil, Sponsor a Family and our volunteer program. There were 3,322 participants in 28 FVPC awareness activities during 2022 and 147 volunteers gave 5990.5 hours of their time to ensure seamless delivery of FVPC services to our community.

Sexual Assault Response Coordinator (SARC)

She serves survivors of sexual violence through initial support, connection to resources, counseling, and group. Not only are these services available to Greene County community members, but the SARC role is active with our local colleges/universities. Celeste currently holds weekly office hours at Cedarville University and Antioch College as a Confidential Advocate for students. This provides a safe space for students to process concerns or experiences without having transportation as a barrier.
